Based on the issues you raised in the first residents' survey and at the subsequent consultation meeting, the Neighbourhood Plan Working Party produced a Vision and Objectives survey and sent it to every household in the village. We asked you to tell us how important you thought the various objectives would be to our community.

Your responses have just been analysed and an overview of the results are outlined in this newsletter.

But first, a BIG THANK YOU for completing the second Survey. Some 206 (60%) questionnaires have been returned.

The views that you expressed will be at the centre of our Neighbourhood Plan, the draft of which is currently being written, and will be available for comment over the coming weeks.

In the meantime we would like to invite all residents to attend a public meeting on **Monday 6th June 2016 at 7pm in the Village Hall** to hear in more detail the results of the survey and what the next steps will be.

Comment: On average 87% of respondents support the proposals set out in Objective 3.

Objective 4: Deliver modest development that is sensitive to the environment, infrastructure constraints and improves the quality of life of all current and future residents.

4.2 Identify sites suitable for housing development. Proposals for new housing developments should adopt the approach to design, siting and layout that will be set out in the Plan. Comment: On average 77% of respondents support the proposals set out in Objective 5.

Conclusions:

The issues raised by the Parish Council Neighbourhood Planning Working Party through its discussions and consultations with residents have been considered throughout our community and the overwhelming support for the village to have its own Neighbourhood Plan is clearly demonstrated by the fact that an unprecedented 60% of households responded to both residents' surveys.

The results from those surveys have shown that:

We agree the issues that are important to the village.

We appreciate living in Earswick and its surroundings.

The majority of residents do not want to see any housing development on the greenbelt but in the event that some development does occur they feel it is essential that policies are in place to reflect the wishes of the community. On average 80% of respondents support the Vision and Objectives proposals. Whilst we are happy to embrace change and progress we want to ensure that we retain the character of Earswick.

Next Steps

Draw up a draft neighbourhood plan incorporating the results of the consultations to date.

Send the draft out for consultation within the village.

When this has been completed, make any changes deemed appropriate and send it to City of York Council for circulation to the statutory consultees.

Make any necessary amendments to the document.

Send the document for public examination.

Submit the Neighbourhood Plan to a local referendum.

It is envisaged that the draft will go out to local consultation in early July 2016 and that the process will culminate in the referendum in late 2016.
